The BSTS Autumn Lecture:

The Kuwaiti Government, and a timely replacement for Prof. Paul Nicholls as guest speaker

The now globally stretched communications between the BSTS's officers were put to their severest test just a few days before the Autumn Meeting, scheduled for 25 October, 1995. With little more than a week to go, our guest speaker **Professor Paul Nicholls** faxed that he had been asked by the Kuwaiti government to go to Kuwait at unavoidably short notice to advise on pharmaceutical education, and could therefore no longer give the lecture.

These sorts of eventualities underline the usefulness of the 'reply-slip' system for members wishing to attend our lectures, but even so, rather than upset those who sometimes travel long distances to turn up 'on spec' on the night, we asked Professor Nicholls if he might provide a text of his lecture that could be read for him. In the event he went one better, supplying an Iranian colleague, **Dr. Bijan Riazi-Farzad**, also of Cardiff University's Welsh School of Pharmacy, to speak on the same theme on his own account.

Professor Nicholls recommended his replacement as 'a fine philosopher with wide interests' and Dr. Riazi-Farzad's presentation turned out to be most professional and excellently balanced in the very best traditions of the BSTS. The next BSTS Lecture Wednesday 24 April 1996

Dr-Allan Mills to speak on: 'The Image on the Shroud: Product of the 'Yellowing Reaction'?'

In the latest issue* of *Interdisciplinary Science Reviews*, a scientific journal with a glittering Editorial Board that includes the Baron George Porter, Baron Alexander Todd of Trumpington and a certain **Professor E.T. Hall** of Oxford, there appears a suitably authoritative article 'Image Formation on the Shroud of Turin: the reactive oxygen intermediates hypothesis'. The author is longstanding BSTS member Dr. Allan Mills of the Department of Physics and Astronomy at the University of Leicester, and Dr. Mills has kindly agreed to present his arguments in more

popularised form for the Society's Spring Lecture. His basic hypothesis is that the Shroud's image was produced by singlet oxygen lost from the body promoting a long-term 'yellowing reaction' on the cloth

Dr. Mills, who was one of the BSTS's earliest speakers following its foundation in 1977, is in the best tradition of interdisciplinary scientists. He began his career with a degree in chemistry, then followed this up with a postdoctoral fellowship within the Department of Geology and Mineralogy at Oxford University, and is currently Leicester University's Senior Lecturer in Planetary Science, an appointment shared between the University's Geology and Physics-with-Astronomy departments. His present line of research is Martian regoliths (mantle rock), and the possible emergence of microbial life on Mars. Dr. Mills became focused on how the Shroud's image was formed as a result of noting its affinity to the imprints produced by some pressed plants on their mounting paper. Then he happened to browse through a textbook on the biochemistry of free radicals, and there evolved the hypothesis that he will present at the BSTS's next meeting:
