


John Klotz - A Tribute

If, as a producer, I went to Central Casting and asked for a classic New York "defender of the underdog" lawyer willing to go the extra mile for justice, even, if necessary, at his own expense and they sent round John Klotz I would have been well satisfied. But, not only did John look and sound the part, in my experience, he was the part.

Some are born with a musical ear. They know a dissonance when they hear one. John was someone who knew an injustice when he heard one. I suspect that is what took him into his branch of law. His battles were legendary, yet rarely chronicled — fighting against the poverty barons of the South Bronx, crooked real estate developers, mobsters, the discriminatory machinery of the Education Department — and his specialty was pushing insurgent political candidates

through New York City's arcane and tangled election laws¹.

Perhaps his best-known client was pro bono - the man depicted on the Shroud. Whoever he might be, John sensed that his "trial" had been a travesty of justice. Despite the best of intentions of the main protagonists he knew from experience that events, misunderstandings, egos, financial outcomes, and politics could distort even the most important legal cases He also knew that to argue his case, with the weight of a secular establishment against him, he had to dig deep into all the evidence and leave no



stone unturned in his quest. The result is set out in his masterful account of everything that led up to the test. I commend it to anyone who really wants to understand the background. (Available on Amazon.)
